

Key Terms: Weighted Average Market Capitalization: The average of the weighted capitalizations of a portfolio's holdings. Price/Earnings Ratio (P/E): The price of stock divided by its annual earnings per share. Price/Book Ratio (P/B): The ratio of a stock's price to its book value per share. Price/Cash Flow Ratio: The ratio of a stock's price to its cash flow per share. Dividend Yield: The return earned by a stock investor, calculated by dividing the amount of annual dividends per share by the current share price of the stock. Standard Deviation: Defines how widely returns varied from an average over a given period of time. A higher standard deviation means a more volatile portfolio. For example, a portfolio with a standard deviation of 6 and an average annual return of 10% saw annualized monthly returns fall within 6 percentage points of that average (or between 4% and 16%) two-thirds of the time. Dispersion: A measure of the amount of uncertainty and risk associated with a portfolio.
